LARRY SCOTT, CHIEFTAIN OF THE GAMES



This year's Chieftain of the Games is Larry Scott, the editor and publisher of the Scottish Newsletter, which began eight years ago as a means of connecting our various Scottish groups on Vancouver Island with news about local Scottish events. The newsletter has continued through Covid with items of interest from Scottish and Celtic history. Various members of the local Scottish community contribute articles about their organization or about a topic of Scottish or Celtic culture that interest them.

Larry is a past secretary of the St. Andrew's & Caledonian Society (now closed), a current member of the Victoria Saltire Society and a supporter of the Victoria Scottish Cultural Centre Society. He grew up at Maxville, Ontario which is the home of the Glengarry Highland Games. It seemed natural to learn the pipes as a teenager. As a young adult he played in a Canadian composite pipe band that participated in the 25th anniversary of the Edinburgh Military Tattoo, in 1970. (Later this became the Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo.) Larry played in other bands including the Lorne Scots and the 48th Highlanders, as well as various Legion pipe bands.

Larry is a graduate of the University of Toronto (history) and Princeton Theological Seminary. He served thirty-five years as a United Church minister. These days, due to age and health issues, he only dabbles a bit with some mini bagpipes. Further retirement dabbling includes trips to Scotland, learning some elementary Gaelic, serving for a number of years as an interpretive docent at Craigdarroch Castle, and having published

The Duckling House, a humorous novel about life in Victoria.

Learn more about the plans on reviving this property and building a Scottish Cultural Centre through fundraising efforts, and how you can become involved. The original Highland Games were founded by King Malcolm III The first Highland Games were held in Scotland in the 11th century, known as Canmore (1058-1093).

They were originally created to find the fittest men to deliver messages for the King. In later years, these gathering were used as training exercises for clan warriors.

They included tests of strength, agility, accuracy and stamina of the candidates such as the caber toss, the sheaf toss, and the stone throw.

Featuring competitions on Piping and drumming, dancing, heavy athletics, as well as all kinds of entertainment and exhibits, the Victoria Highland Games and Celtic Festival celebrates and helps promote the Scottish and Celtic culture.

What are judges looking for?

In competitions, dancers are judged on three fundamentals: **timing**, **technique** and **general deportment**.

Dancers are judged on their **timing** by their ability to follow and keep to the rhythm of the music.

Good positioning of the feet and hands, strong footwork and coordination of the head and arms are important **techniques** watched closely.

Dancers are judged on **general deportment** through their posture, balance, carriage of their head, body, arms, hands and general confidence and happy demeanor.

While highland dancing is an athletic skill dancers must perform with lightness and graceful ease.

Competition

In competition, each dancer is ranked according to one of five groups: **Primary**, under 7 years of age; **Beginner** until winning 6 different contests; **Novice**, until winning 6 more competitions; **Advanced Intermediate**, for one year from date of last Novice competition; and then **Open or Premiere.** Each of these groups has several age classifications.

Up until the 1900s, Highland Dancing was originally an athletic event for Scottish Men only, to keep soldiers in the Scottish Regiments in top physical shape for battle.

It wasn't until the World Wars that women started dancing, to keep their heritage and culture alive while men fought in war. Today, Highland Dancing organizations and schools exist around the world and women outnumber men significantly.

Their sound is rooted in the traditional Irish, Scottish and English music that many love, and features carefully crafted arrangements, rhythmic spirited energy and captivating storytelling.

Cookeilidh

Cookeilidh has been delighting audiences for over 15 years with their high energy traditional, and modernized Celtic tunes. Comprised of 12-string guitar, electric bass, Irish flute, fiddle, bodhran, and vocals, they weave their own special blend of Trad with Attitude, Celtic Craic, and Pot O' Gold Folk!

The Hounds of Cuchulain

The Hounds of Cuchulain are a fourpiece folk band from Victoria BC who perform a wide selection of Irish, Scottish, English, and original songs in the Celtic tradition dating from the 1600's all the way up to the 1980's. The group's performances feature rowdy pub songs, historical ballads, energetic dance tunes, engaging storytelling, and haunting airs on the Irish harp.

Black Angus

Black Angus is an enduring musical outfit, about good friends, good humour, and good music. The harmonic duo at the core of Black Angus is Gareth Hurwood and Alex MacCuaig, who started their evolving partnership within the Celtic tradition in 2007. Accompanying themselves on acoustic guitar and upright bass, the boys of Black Angus delve into the familiar and the original from the Celtic repertoire and beyond.

Tom Morrissey

Tom Morrissey Band, current members are Tom Morrissey guitar and vocals, Ian Todd bass and vocals, Patrick Allen drums and vocals. High energy East coast music. based on Vancouver island Playing pubs, clubs and festivals all over Canada. Tom Morrissey Band brings high energy east coast music and pub favorites to every show.

As a classically trained violinist, Ceilidh began her post secondary education at the Victoria Conservatory of Music through their joint diploma program with Camosun College. She then transferred to the University of Ottawa to study with the late Yehonotan Berick to complete her Bachelors of Music in violin performance.

through song.

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

HEAVY EVENTS SUN

The Events

The Heavy Events have been contested at Highland Games for centuries, starting with games set up by King Malcolm III of Scotland to select the strongest men in Scotland to serve as his personal bodyguards. Implements used are those that were in use at that period of history, blacksmith's weight's, hammers used for driving fence posts, stones from the local rivers and trees cut down by woodsmen. There are nine traditional events that you will see contested and all are a true test of not only strength but skill and athleticism.

Sheaf Toss

The Sheaf is a burlap sack weighing up to 20lbs that is thrown for height using a pitch fork. Rules are very similar to the Weight for Height and again the athlete who clears the greatest height being the winner.

Throwing the Hammer

The Hammer involves a weighted head attached to a rigid pvc handle. The Hammer is spun overhead multiple times and released so that the Hammer flies behind the athlete. The Light Hammer weighs 16lbs for Men and 12lbs for Women and the Heavy Hammer weighs 22lbs for Men and 16lbs for Women.

Weight for Distance

The athlete uses a spinning technique to throw either the Lightweight (28lbs for Men and 14lbs for Women) or the Heavy Weight (56lbs for Men and 28lbs for Women). The weights involve a ball and chain measuring no more than 18" and are thrown with one hand aiming for greatest distance.

Putting the Stone

The precursor to the modern Olympic shot put, the Stone Put is thrown in two styles. The Braemar Stone is a standing throw with no approach and a stone weighing up to 28lbs. The Open Stone weighing up to 2olbs is thrown with the option of an approach (glide, spin, etc).

Tossing the Caber

A Caber is a tapered log measuring up to 20+ feet. The athlete will attempt to pick up the Caber and balance it holding the small end. He will then run with the Caber and attempt to flip the Caber end over end. The Caber is not thrown for distance but rather accuracy using the hands of a clock. The goal is for the Caber to flip and land straight in line with the direction he was running, a perfect score being at 12 o'clock.

Weight for Height

Weight for Height is one of the greatest tests of explosive power in Heavy Events. A 56lbs weight is thrown with one hand overhead for maximum height. The athlete has three attempts at each height and is scored on the last successful height cleared. The winner is the athlete that clears the greatest height.

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PIPING & DRUMMING EAT SUN



Piping Judge **Brian Switalla**

Brian resides in Auckland, New Zealand and

commenced his piping at age 11. He has won all the Premier Solo Piping Competitions in New Zealand, including 9 New Zealand Championships. The Gold Medal and Clasp (2) for Piobaireachd playing at Hastings, and the Senior Clasp March Strathspey and Reel event at Christchurch on 12 occasions. He has won the Gold Medal for Piobaireachd and was most points winner at the RU Brown Competition held in Adelaide, Australia

Brian is on the New Zealand Judging Panel for both Bands and Solos, and has adjudicated in New Zealand, Australia, Scotland, Canada and America. He holds the Advanced Certificate in Piping with the Royal New Zealand Pipe Bands association, and is an Associate Principle of the New Zealand College of Piping. In 2016 Brian was appointed Convenor of the Royal New Zealand Pipe Band Association Music Judges Committee.

Brian became the Pipe Major of the City of Dunedin Grade One Pipe Band, which won many South Island and Provincial Championships. In 1995 Brian joined the New Zealand Police Pipe Band and played at the World Championships from 1995 to 1999.

In 2000 the opportunity to play with the Field Marshal Montgomery Pipe Band, from Northern Ireland arose. Brian played with the Band in 2000, 2002 (when they won the World Championships) and 2003.

Brian played in the Grade 1 Canterbury Caledonian Society Pipe Band from 2013 to 2016, in which time the band won the New Zealand Championships every year and was placed in the top ten at the World Pipe Band Championships in 2013, 2014 and 2015.

In 2016 Brian became a Royal Scottish Pipe Band Association Piping Adjudicator (the first New Zealander to be admitted to the panel).

Drumming Judge Paul Turner

Born in Belfast, Northern Ireland, Paul started drumming at the age of five under the tutorship of his father and at the age of 10 was with his father and the Saintfield Pipe Band. In 1977 he became a founder member of The Royal Ulster Constabulary Pipe Band and the Leading Drummer started in 1983 and followed by spells with the ScotRail Vale of Atholl and then with the Victoria Police in Australia. During Paul's time in Australia, he travelled extensively in the Southern Hemisphere teaching and performing with the Victoria Police Band.

In 1989, Paul won the World Solo Drumming Championship in Glasgow and has been a member of the R.S.P.B.A. adjudicator's panel since 1985 and served on the music board on a number of occasions. He has travelled throughout Europe, Nth America, Asia, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa teaching and adjudicating.

After returning from Australia and following a short period as leading drummer with the Grampian Police Pipe Band, Paul joined Dysart & Dundonald Pipe band as Leading Drummer in July 1997 and held this position until September 2004. Paul returned as Lead Drummer of the Robert Wiseman Dairies Vale of Atholl Pipe Band in September 2005.

Paul is now a full-time adjudicator with the R.S.P.B.A. in both Drumming and Ensemble disciplines and a current member of the Adjudicators Panel Management Board. Paul is also a member of the Adjudicator Training and Development Group and part of the World Solo Drumming Competition

The word "piobaireachd" literally means pipe playing or pipe music, but is now

used to describe the classical music of the Great Highland Bagpipe. Another name for it is "Ceol Mor" meaning the Big Music, which separates Piobaireachd from all other forms of bag pipe music (marches, reels, jigs etc.) which are referred to as "Ceol Beag" – the Little Music.



It consists of a theme or "ground", with a succession of increasingly complex variations that follow the theme. These variations are divided into movements and performed in (relatively) rigorously defined order and manner. Pibroch compositions are distinguished from other traditional Scottish tunes by their considerable length (typically 8 12 minutes long), slow rhythm, complex ornamentation and virtuosic nature.

Nothing resembling piobaireachd has been discovered in any other country in the world. The open Piobaireachd competition, featuring the top pipers in the Pacific Northwest, is proudly sponsored by the Macaloney's Island Distillery & Twa Dogs Brewery.

He has been the director of ceremonies and massed bands throughout the Southwestern United States, he has also served as Vice Chieftain for the Las Vegas Celtic Society Highland Games. Ken was selected as one of the Kings of Mardi Gras in New Orleans for the Krewe of Okeanos in 2012. Ken has served as a Senior Drum Major in the Victoria Military Tattoo and as the Senior Drum Major in the New York Tattoo. He is very proud of his association with the Las Vegas Pipe Band and the Las Vegas Emerald Society Pipe Band.

Drum Major Judge **Alan McBride**

Alan lives in Kilkeel, County Down, the southern-most town in Northern Ireland. Alan started competing in drum majors at the of age 7 alongside his sister Violet and brother Harry. Their tutor was their father Henry and even though he was pipe major of the band he still was able to hone their drum majoring skills.

As a drum major, Alan has been 5 times World Champion, won 13 All-Ireland titles, 13 Ulster, Scottish, British, Cowal, European and Australian titles. He has travelled all over the world for contests, exhibitions, workshops and judging.

He has also taken part at various tattoos/

shows in Russia, Germany, Switzerland and Australia. In 2021 Alan was awarded the BEM (British Empire Medal) in the Queens birthdays honours list"

He started his singing career in the Kilkeel High School musicals and since then has performed for an RTE stage production of Carosel, Titanic the Musical in the Opera House Belfast, the Lyceum London, on BBC tv and radio, for former Irish President, Mary McAleese at Áras an Uachtaráin, Dublin and at Stormont Buildings, Belfast. He has sung and drum majored at the Avenches tattoo in Switzerland and the Senior Drum Major at the Spasskaya Military Tattoo on Red Square in Moscow for the last few years.





Drum Major **Jason Paguio**

From Coronado, California, Jason Paguio is a 6-time World Champion Drum Major. Jason won his first world title in the Juvenile category (18 & under) in 2004. In 2007, he made international history by becoming the first person from outside the United Kingdom to win the World Drum Major Championships in Glasgow, Scotland.

Following that title, he has qualified as a finalist consecutively and repeated his World Championship wins in 2010,2013, 2014, and 2019, making him the most successful

active competitor currently at the World Championships and tied for the second most World Championship titles.

Originally a classically trained trumpet player, Jason's began his drum major career in an American-style marching band. Jason is honoured to represent Simon Fraser University Pipe Band as their drum major, performing with the band in local contests, at the World Pipe Band Championships, in many of the band's concerts, and throughout the world.

Professionally, he is the President and CEO of the Asian Business Association of San Diego.

Primary Elements of Judgement

EXECUTION – the technical aspects of playing an instrument with controlled sound.

MUSICAL EXPRESSION – the ability

to properly phrase tunes at tempos that contribute to its overall musicality.

TONE & TUNING – the overall sound of the instruments. Proper tuning and blending of the chanter and drones contributes to tone. Tuning should be done so that no wavering sound is

detected as the instrument is played.

ENSEMBLE – pertains to band competitions. The ensemble judge listens to the 'fit' of the drum score to the pipe music, the balance of volumes from side, tenor, and bass drums with the pipes, and the overall effect of 'one great instrument'.



Drum Major Colleen Wilson

Colleen Wilson began competing in 2014 in Scottish Highland Games throughout California, Nevada, and Arizona, as well as Invitational contests that include The Monterey Classic and the Victoria Highland Games in British Columbia. Colleen won Overall Champion at the Victoria Games in 2022.

Colleen's crowning achievement to date was performing in the 2022 Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo August of 2022, appearing in all 25 shows as part of an international flourishing Drum Major team. She has also performed in International Military Tattoos in Colorado and Arizona.

Colleen is the Drum Major for the City of Sacramento Pipe Band and a Drum Major for the Mesa Caledonia Pipe Band in Arizona.

Drum Major Liam Renton

Liam is a Wind Turbine Technician, Living in Campbeltown (The Mull of Kintyre), Scotland and is the Drum Major for Inveraray & District Pipe Band. He began learning the Mace and to become at Drum Major at the age of 9 and by the end of the Juvenile section (U18's) his confidence and results began to improve. He has been teaching at workshops and performing at Tattoos and events in the UK, Europe and the US from the age of 14, the friendships he has made with people from all different countries and cultures throughout the world is something he greatly appreciates.

He loves to perform in front of an audience and hope that anyone watching will give cheer him on when the mace goes up in the air, the buzz is impossible to replicate.

Kara moved into the Senior Drum Major grade last year, and achieved All Ireland Champion, Scottish Champion, European Champion, World Champion and Scottish Champion of Champions.

What is a drum major?

A drum major leads a pipe band while marching and is responsible for providing commands and directions of what the band will play and when.

The commands may be given either verbally, through hand gestures or with the use of their mace. The drum major often holds the responsibility to keep the band organized and structured.

The Scottish Drum Major competition is an exciting highlight of any highland games, providing the audience with a perfect spectacle of tradition, mixed with innovative showmanship.



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
